With NAIDOC Week taking place during the school holidays, in this final week of term we have embarked on a series of events and activities aimed at highlighting the importance of Aboriginal culture and to promote understanding and respect among our students and community.

As a school we have worked with local elder Derek Nannup in a couple of areas. Derek worked with our Year 5 students to help create artwork that reflects where the students are from and how they use the land around them.


This work will be showcased to the school once it is completed. Derek discussed with the students the use of symbolism in Aboriginal storytelling, he likened this to the modern use of emojis, something our students could easily relate to.

Derek also conducted a smoking ceremony for the whole school community. This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to learn about the importance of this event and the connection to land.

The Year 4 students have continued their bush school learning by working with Mark Tucek from 'Tucker Bush'. Mark taught the students about bush tucker plants as they undertook a planting program in our Bush Tucker Garden.

The Year 4's also engaged with a Kaarakin cockatoo session. This was informative as the students learnt about this wonderful creature that is native to the Alkimos area.

The students in Year 3 explored the Alkimos walking trail that tells some of the stories of the local area and how the Noongar people used to live off this land.

Jo initially ran a workshop with the students before providing them with a traditional Maori 'hangi' for lunch.

In the ELC the students worked with Yalkarang Consulting who shared about Noongar culture and being respectful.

The students also cooked damper on an open fire that was set up in the Djerabin Boodja.

I am passionate about creating a strong sense of community and working together to support the needs of our students, parents and staff.


